

# **Reflective Optical Sensor with Transistor Output**

### **Description**


The TCRT5000(L) has a compact construction where the emitting-light source and the detector are arranged in the same direction to sense the presence of an object by using the reflective IR beam from the object. The operating wavelength is 950 mm. The detector consists of a phototransistor.

## **Applications**


- Position sensor for shaft encoder
- Detection of reflective material such as paper, IBM cards, magnetic tapes etc.
- Limit switch for mechanical motions in VCR
- General purpose wherever the space is limited




Figure 1. Test circuit




Figure 2. Test circuit




Figure 3. Total Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 4. Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage




Figure 5. Rel. Current Transfer Ratio vs. Ambient Temp.




Figure 6. Collector Current vs. Forward Current




Figure 7. Collector Emitter Saturation Voltage vs.
Collector Current




Figure 8. Current Transfer Ratio vs. Forward Current












Figure 9. Relative Collector vs. Distance



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


#### **Dimensions of TCRT5000 in mm**
